The amendment's financial impact primarily comes from expected sales táx collections. If legal today, sales of non-medical marijuana would be subject to sales tax and would remain so if

marijuana would generate at least \$195.6 million annually in state and local sales tax revenues once the retail market is fully operational, although the timing of this occurring is unclear. Under current law, the existing statutory framework for medical marijuana is repealed six months after the effective date of this amendment which affects how this amendment will be implemented. A new regulator structure for both medical and nonmedical use of marijuana will be needed. Its design cannot be fully known until the legislature acts; however, regulatory costs will probably be offset by regulatory fees. Other potential costs and savings cannot be predicted. No. 4 Constitutional Amendment Article I, New Section Amendment to Limit Government Interference with Abortion

GOVERNMENT SERVICES.

No law shall prohibit, penalize, delay, or restrict abortion before viability or when necessary to protect the patient's health, as determined by the patient's healthcare provider. This amendment does not change the Legislature's constitutional authority to require notification to a parent or guardian before a minor has an abortion.

The proposed amendment would result in significantly more abortions and fewer live births per year in Florida. The increase in abortions could be even greater if the amendment invalidates laws requiring parental consent before minors undergo abortions and those ensuring only licensed physicians perform abortions. There is also uncertainty about whether the amendment will require the state to subsidize abortions with public funds. Litigation to resolve those

and other uncertainties will result in additional costs to the state government and state courts that will negatively impact the state budget. An increase in abortions may negatively affect the growth of state and local revenues over time. Because the fiscal impact of increased abortions on state and local revenues and costs cannot be estimated with precision, the total impact of the proposed amendment is indeterminate. THE FINANCIAL IMPACT OF THIS AMENDMENT CANNOT BE DETERMINED DUE TO AMBIGUITIES AND UNCERTAINTIES SURROUNDING THE AMENDMENT'S IMPACT.



No. 5 Constitutional Amendment Article VII, Section 6 and Article XII

Annual Adjustments to the Value of Certain Homestead Exemptions

Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to require an annual adjustment for inflation to the value of current or future homestead exemptions that apply solely to levies other than school district levies and for which every person who has legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains thereon the permanent residence of the owner, or another person legally or naturally dependent upon the owner is eligible. This amendment takes effect January 1, 2025.

CHARTER AMENDMENT REQUIRING STUDY BY CONSULTING FIRM TO DETERMINE IF IMPACT FEES SHOULD BE IMPOSED

Shall the Charter of Wakulla County be amended to require, beginning January of 2025 and every five years thereafter, that the Board of County Commissioners commission an independent review by a professional consulting firm skilled in the area of impact fee studies? The purpose of this study is to determine if impact fees are warranted within Wakulla County and where impact fee funds should be allotted if impact fees are initiated through ordinance.



Wakulla County Ordinance No. 2024-17

CHARTER AMENDMENT REQUIRING ADOPTION OF COUNTY ORDINANCE REGULATING PEDESTRIAN AND VEHICLE INTERACTIONS SUCH AS PANHANDLING

Shall the Charter of Wakulla County be amended to require the Board of County Commissioners to adopt an ordinance, with approved exemptions and designated penalties for violations, to regulate and attempt to mitigate dangerous interactions between pedestrians and motorists, such as panhandling or non-permitted solicitations, at medians, public right of ways, crosswalks, sidewalks, arterial roads, and other applicable public spaces?



Wakulla County Ordinance No. 2024-18

CHARTER AMENDMENT REQUIRING CHARTER REVIEW COMMISSION CONVENE EVERY SIX YEARS INSTEAD OF EVERY EIGHT YEARS

Shall the Charter of Wakulla County be amended to require the Charter Review Commission be convened every six years, rather than every eight years as currently required, with the next Charter Review Commission to be appointed not later than July 1, 2029, and every six years thereafter? The Charter Review Commission consists of fifteen County electors who review and present recommendations for amendment, revision or repeal of the Wakulla County Charter.
